Egg Toss Game

Sometimes it's fun to get caught with egg on your face!!

Materials Needed:

Uncooked eggs

How to Play:

1. Divide players into pairs and split the entire group into two rows with the paired players facing one another, approximately 4 feet apart
2. Choose one row and hand each player in that row an egg
3. On the count of three, everyone tosses the egg to their partners who should plan to catch it
4. For each person who catches an egg, without the egg breaking, ask them to take one step back; If a partner breaks the egg (whether in their hand or on the ground), that team is eliminated
5. Repeat the tossing, indicating this time that the receiving players toss the eggs to their partners. Again, those who manage to catch the eggs without cracking them must take a step back before tossing the eggs again.
6. Continue the game until all pairs but one are eliminated
7. Award the winning pair a prize, if desired

Egg in a Spoon Race

Kids are sure to "crack up" during this exciting game!!!

Materials Needed:

Either boiled eggs (for tiny tots) or raw eggs (for older children); spoons

How to Play:

1. The competitors line up next to each other, each one holding a spoon with an egg on it, with one hand
2. With one hand behind their back, the children race to the finishing line, trying not to drop their eggs
3. If using raw eggs: if someone's egg falls off the spoon and falls to the ground, they are eliminated; if using boiled eggs: you can choose to allow the contestant to pick the egg back up but he/she can't begin racing again until one hand is behind their back and the other is holding the spoon w/egg
4. The first one across the finish line wins
5. NOTE: You can make the length of the race as long or short; straight or curvy; as desired pending age of participants



Dinosaur Dig

You're not alone, find those dino bones!!! Just like the experts; have fun, get filthy and find those fossils...

Materials Needed:

A children's kiddy pool or sandbox; 1 box of Medium Milkbone Dog Biscuits; 3 special "large" Milkbone dog biscuits; a bucket full of mud for each child; "decorations" for mud pie project

How to Play:

1. Set-up: To make the mud pit, fill a blow up pool or sandbox with top soil (free of pesticides, rocks or any added ingredients) and use outdoor hose to mix water with the dirt until desired consistency (dirt can be purchased at Home Depot or other hardware stores); then hide dog biscuits (aka dinosaur bones!) deep in the mud throughout the "pit"
2. Invite children to surround the mud-pit and come up with their own dinosaur name which they announce at game time
3. Going clock-wise, give each child a chance to announce their "dino name" and stick their arms and hands deep into the mud to dig for a bone. Once they find one, pull it out and put it in their own "mud bucket".
4. Continue to go around the circle until all bones are retrieved.
5. The children who find the 3 "large" bones are winners (Or, you can use all of the same sized bones and compete to find the most bones instead).
6. When children are done digging for dinosaur bones, encourage them to find space on the hardtop or patio and make their own mud pies with their basket of mud and bones

Whipped Crème Pie Eating Contest

Taking the phrase "licking the plate" to a whole new level!

Materials Needed:

Empty pie crusts; whipped cream

How to Play:

1. Fill all of the pie crusts completely with whipped cream
2. Seat all players at a table with the cream-filled pie crusts in front of them; hands MUST be behind their backs!
3. On the count of three, players start eating their pies with their mouths only; player raises two arms in the air when they believe they finished their whole pie (crusts not included)
4. Whoever finishes their pie first, wins! Keep going for a silver and bronze placing... then encourage players to finish their pies (with or without hands!) after winners are determined
5. NOTE – If this is for a children's birthday party, you can sing happy birthday beforehand and use this as the cake!



Make Your Own Dirt Cake

Mom always says “don’t eat the dirt” – well guess what, now kids can!!

Materials Needed:

Bowls, Oreo cookies, chocolate and/or vanilla pudding, butter, sugar, gummy worms, sprinkles and a beautiful BLUE lollipop to top it off! (you can determine which ingredients work best, there is no recipe to the madness!)

How to Play:

1. There is no winner or loser, the key here is to have fun making a tasty treat!
2. Lay all “ingredients” out on the table and provide each “baker” a bowl to mix in
3. Then it’s easy, kids add their favorite ingredients, crush the cookies, mix the pudding, top with candy – and eat!!

Muddy Handprint Craft

Little hands, no matter clean or dirty, are always, always keepsake worthy!!

Materials Needed:

Plastic Plates, Spatula, Construction Paper, Mud (can be created by mixing chemical free dirt purchased at a hardware store, combined with water)

How to Play:

1. To begin, spoon thick mud onto a plastic plate and flatten it with a spatula
2. Child presses their hand into the mud on the plate and remove it without smudging from side to side
3. Place the plate in the sun so that it can dry naturally
4. NOTE: You can also press the muddy hand on construction paper; while the handprint in the mud on the plate can’t last forever, making a muddy handprint on construction paper will do a better job of preserving the print when framed



Mummy Making Competitions

This contest isn't for "mom's" it's for "mummies!" – wrap up and show off. Just don't wrap the mouth because you'll be laughing too hard!

Materials Needed:

Rolls of masking tape; rolls of toilet paper (amount of each depends on participant number)

How to Play:

1. The goal of the game is to make the best mummy within 5 minutes
2. Arrange groups into teams of four or five people; give each team a roll of toilet paper and a roll of masking tape
3. Each team needs a volunteer to be the "mummy" getting wrapped
4. Using only the toilet paper and tape, teams have 5 minutes to wrap their mummy
5. When 5 minutes is up, the mummies must model their "wrapped-up selves" and teammates present him/her to the "judges" giving reasons why theirs is the best
6. Judges determine winner

Icky Run Obstacle

A whole new take on the traditional "obstacle course" – you may make it through, but you'll never be the same!

Materials Needed:

Kiddy pool filled with mud; giant appliance sized boxes (emptied and bottom opened up like a tunnel); finger paints; whipped cream pies; and sprinkler

How to play:

1. Party leader sets up an "icky" obstacle course including a pool of mud, a run through an open box with finger paints within; a whipped cream plate that needs to be cleared; and of course, a stop to clean off before time runs out!
2. Line up kids for a chance at the obstacle; encourage spectators to cheer on their friends as they run
3. On the count of three, the participant runs to the muddy pool and jumps right in – covers their legs in all mud and continues on to the next stop – running through the open box. Inside the box are finger paints, contestant must use the paints to write his/her name somewhere inside the box; next stop is a plate of whipped cream which must be cleared off (no hands!) before moving on to the sprinkler. Before time runs out, the contestant must spend time in the sprinkler cleaning off all the mud, whipped cream, and paint before they can cross the finish line.
4. Prizes can be given out to participants with the best obstacle times



SuperTy Bingo

Bingo was one of Ty's favorite games. Enjoy this twist on the game that highlights SuperTy's favorite things.

Materials Needed:

Downloadable SUPERTY BINGO cards available in this kit; 31 ping pong balls to write on; bingo ball cage or basket; pennies, M&M's, Skittles or any other item to be used as bingo chips

How to play:

- Write the following 31 words on ping pong balls (one on each): Ladybugs, Birds, Rainbows, Superheroes, Captain America, Spiderman, Laughter, Leaves, CANDY, Balloons, Lollipops, Kites, Angel, Clouds, Flowers, Gingerbread House, Crayons, Christmas, Painting, Goldfish, Carnivals, Max and Ruby, Jumping in Puddles, MUD, Ice Cream Sundaes, Umbrellas, Books, Kisses, SuperTy, Smiles, Fighter
- All players receive a BINGO board with different combinations of the words, as well as BINGO "chips"
- The leader mixes the ping pong balls in the cage or basket and chooses one (balls have those words written on them). Leader announces the word(s) drawn
- Players place a chip on the letter called if they have a match on their board
- Play continues with ball picking/chip placing until someone gets a full row of chips – that person shouts out SUPERTY and is the winner

Water Balloon Toss

Wet shoes? Wet Shirt? No problem!! Water balloons – when getting wet is the name of the game

Materials Needed:

As many balloons as you can get a hold of; a hose or sink to fill balloons with water

How to Play:

1. Divide players into pairs and split the entire group into two rows with the paired players facing one another, approximately 4 feet apart
2. Players toss the water-filled balloon back and forth to partners; if the water balloon breaks (either on the ground or in hands) that team is eliminated
3. Have teams step back as play progresses to make the challenge more difficult
4. The last pair with an unbroken water balloon wins
5. NOTE: To make "messier" cover the water balloons in shaving cream!



How Many Water Marbles?

***Don't worry about the mess, just take your best guess!!!
It's a number guessing game!***

Materials Needed

Several containers of water marbles; shaving cream; 5 various sizes of disposable baking pans

How to Play:

1. This is a guessing game that can create some fun. Set up all five pans on a table and fill with shaving cream; Then, add a certain # of water marbles to each pan
2. Have an adult at the end of the table with a paper and pen to document the contestant's guesses
3. Contestant starts at the first tray and feels through the shaving cream to see if he/she can guess how many water marbles are hidden within; contestant tells the "documenter" their # and moves on to the next trays making the same guesstimates
4. Note: The contestant only has 60 seconds to complete all 5 trays, so they will not have time to feel each marble and count
5. At the end of the game, "documenter" will reveal the winners – those who were closest to the correct # for each tray

TY-dyed Tees

***Be creative, have fun, laugh, enjoy. It's SuperTy's way –
make a TY-dyed tee and wear it in honor of Ty!***

Materials Needed:

100% cotton white tees; tables for workstation w/disposable tablecloth; big buckets of soapy water; bins for dye mix; colored fabric dyes (for longer-lasting color use a dye kit with soda ash included); plastic gloves; rubber bands if desired

How to Play:

1. Set up a place to work. Setting up outside would be best, since a mess is highly likely.
2. Cover the workstation with a plastic sheet or disposable plastic tablecloth. Have a bucket of soapy water on hand.
3. Prepare dye (according to directions) in the bins.
4. Soak the tees in cold water; create your design by twisting the shirts or tying the shirts in knots for a different look. To create the traditional "bull's eye" look, wrap rubber bands around the shirt if desired.
5. Put on the plastic gloves and dip the tied shirt into the dye baths. If just one color is desired, soak the shirt in the dye bath and let sit according to directions on the dye packet. If a multicolored shirt is desired, then dip the shirt into all colors desired.
6. Ring the Tee out and put it in a re-sealable plastic bag; leave the tee in bag overnight and remove the next day. Rinse until the water runs clean
7. Put the shirt in the dryer which will set the color into the fabric from the heat



Sprinkler Rover

Red Rover, Red Over, You'll get wet when you run over!!!

Materials Needed:

Sprinkler; 8 or more children

How to Play:

1. You need a group of kids to play this game, it is similar to "Red Rover". Line children up in two lines, holding hands, and place a sprinkler between the lines and turn it on
2. One team chants "Red Rover, Red Rover, send [child from other team] right over"
3. That child then runs through the sprinkler and tries to break through the line of hands on the other side
4. If the child gets through, he can go back to his team; if not, he joins the team who called him
5. The goal of the game is to get all children on your team

Water Hose Limbo

How LOOOOW can you go (and you'll be getting wet so don't go slow!)

Materials Needed:

A hose with spray nozzle

How to Play:

1. Children should take turns holding the sprinkler for the other children – spray the water straight ahead at the same height
2. One at a time, the children try to crawl or walk under the spray of water without getting wet; if he or she gets wet, they are out of the round
3. Once all children pass through, those who are successful must try to get through under lower spray
4. Play continues until no children remaining can walk under the sprinkler line
5. NOTE: It will be more fun if you play the LIMBO song during this game!



Cotton Face Funtime

You thought that milk-mustache looked silly, wait until you see these cotton-covered cheeks!!

Materials Needed:

Vaseline, cotton balls

How to Play:

1. Place piles of cotton in front of each contestant; ask each contestant to cover their face in vaseline! (Be careful of eyes)
2. On the count of three, kids dive their faces into the cotton to see who can make the most cotton stick to the Vaseline on their faces without using their hands
3. Let them think that whoever has the most cotton on their face wins...BUT.. the real winner is the one who can shake all or most of the cotton OFF their face without using their hands!

Good Ol' Fashion Food Fight

Every kid loves a food fight. There's nothing better than eating your favorite food; except throwing it!

Materials Needed:

Any foods that are safe, fun, and messy to throw! And, maybe some old clothes or smocks for the participants. Children's safety goggles are not required, but might be a fun and safe way to get the group excited for the activity!

How to Play:

1. The most important rule of this game is to set boundaries – let the kids know where the “food throwing” area is; also, where it is safe to throw food and where it is not (ie. Avoid other children's eyes, etc.)
2. Each child gets a bucket of food to “fight” with
3. Let the kids enjoy running around while getting messy!



Melt The Ice

It's only a penny, but you need it quick! Be creative, use your brain, just don't crack the ice!

Materials Needed:

Ice cubes with penny in the middle; food colored

How to Play:

1. Children are divided into pairs and presented an ice cube on a paper plate.
2. The ice cube has been colored with food coloring and in the middle is a penny.
3. The object of the game is to be the first to melt the ice cube and get the penny (without BREAKING the ice cube).
4. Children can be creative and do their best to be the first to win!

Baby Diaper Relays

It's just pudding, but its still a mess! Who can change their "baby's" diaper, the quickest and the best!?!

Materials Needed:

Baby diapers, wipes or napkins, spoons, chocolate pudding, squash or gourd to act as "baby"

How to Play:

1. Divide teams into groups of four or so kids
2. Each group will need a squash or gourd for their "baby" that they will have to apply a diaper to
3. Teams each spread out along one side of the table in an "assembly type" line
4. The first team member spoons pudding onto the diaper and fasten it onto the baby; the next person removes the dirty diaper and cleans the baby and applies a fresh diaper;
5. The team to finish first and have their "baby" fresh and clean, wins! The other teams should keep going until their baby is clean
6. NOTE: This won't go as quickly as it seems!



Donut Fishing

Donuts aren't just for breakfast – they can be for lunch, dinner, snack, or party games like this!

Materials Needed:

Donuts, chocolate syrup, sticks and string (or yarn), chairs

How to Play:

1. Tie a donut to the yarn and drizzle chocolate syrup all over the donut
2. Teams will each pick members to hold the pole and members to eat the donut
3. Children being fed the donut sit in the chair and children using the pole to feed them stand with the pole over their heads dangling the donut for them to eat
4. NO HANDS! The seated child can only use their mouth to eat the donut
5. The first team to finish the entire donut is the winner

Gelatin Footprints

Beat the heat and cool your feet! While making quite the lovely take-home treat!

Materials Needed:

Buckets or plastic bins; Flavored refrigerated gelatin; heavy butcher type paper

How to Play:

1. Put different colored gelatins each in different buckets
2. Put the butcher paper next to the buckets, leading from one bucket to the next
3. Line the kids up with bare feet while wearing shorts or a bathing suit, and have them step in a bucket of gelatin. Tell them to squish it all around, top and bottom and between those little toes!
4. Kids step out of the container onto the sheets of heavy paper and walk across making colored footprints
5. Let the pictures dry and display their “foot-art!”



Treasure Hunt

Ahoy...get your mates on board and get ready to find ye ol' golden treasure!

Materials Needed:

Clue cards (to be developed by the individual party planner because clues will vary depending on the venue); items to find for the treasure; decorated boxes for “treasure chests” for each team

How to Play:

1. Separate the kids into teams of four; read them all a clue to lead them to the first treasure (for smaller groups, the children can compete individually or in teams of two)
2. Once a team finds the treasure, they immediately bring it back to “the captain,” put the item in their team’s homemade “treasure chest” and they score a point
3. Another clue is read
4. This continues for as many clues as you’d like
5. NOTE: A fun way to start this game is to have team members decorate their own treasure chest (which can be a cardboard box) with paint, glitter, markers, stickers, etc.

Creative Play Center

Nothing says fun like a table full of crafts galore – for kids (and adults!) to use their imagination!

Materials Needed:

Paper, fabrics, finger paints, glitter art, splash paint, markers, glitter glue, sparkles, puffy paint, stickers, beads, and more!

How to Play:

1. Just lay a plethora of creative, fun art materials out on a picnic table and let them GO AT IT! Draw, paint, glue, cut – just be a kid and use your creative mind in this “creative play center”!



“Here’s Lookin’ at You Kid” Stations

Whether a girl or boy, this station will have a cool new look for every kid at the party!

Materials Needed:

Nail polish, face paint, temporary tattoos, hair accessories, anything else to help “decorate” a kid!

How to Play:

1. Whether it is a manicure, pedicure, a painted butterfly on the cheek or a superman tattoo, kids can come to this station and look cooler than ever before!

Fun Doesn’t Stop for Lunch

Let your little participants help make their own lunch or snacks, and let them get messy while doing it!

Materials Needed:

Tacos and all the fixin’s; pizza dough, sauce and toppings; ice cream, syrups and toppings

How to Play:

1. Under supervision, let the children help to fix their own lunch or snacks throughout the day.
2. There can be a “make your own taco” or “make your own pizza” bar for lunch
3. A sundae bar with various flavors of ice cream and toppings for dessert is always a big hit. Or, you can give the children everything they need to decorate their own cookies or cupcakes.
